Development of a scientific understanding of the causes of mental health problems. This will involve an ability to critically evaluate biological, psychological, and social models of mental health problems as well as understanding the role of interventions for mental health problems.

Gain a set of skills for effective service user engagement and experience of the use, scoring and administering of psychometric instruments that may be used in a clinical setting.

We expect graduates to be able to demonstrate reflective skills that will support learning and development as a psychologist and understand the role of empirical evidence in the discipline of clinical psychology.

BSC (HONS) PSYCHOLOGY WITH HEALTH AND WELLBEING

Focuses on developing knowledge of how Psychology can be used as a proactive tool to try and create a healthier and happy society.

Develop scientific understanding of a range of health and wellbeing areas, and the intersection between health and wellbeing, psychology, and other allied disciplines, to the explanation of health, and the promotion of healthy behaviours.

Lecturers will encourage the application of empirical evidence grounded in psychology and allied disciplines to the understanding of health and wellbeing, and health-related behaviours, and

help develop an understanding of the role that empirical evidence plays in health

and wellbeing.
